How often does YOUR state swear? Researchers find New Jersey and Connecticut use the most profanity - but are also the most honest

- Researchers found that honest people are more likely to use profanity
- People are more likely to swear to express themselves than to cause harm
- Two of the three US states with the highest profanity rate, Connecticut and New Jersey, were also two of the three states with the highest integrity scores



Researchers have found that honest people are more likely to swear, and states who swore more had higher integrity scores.

Two of the three states with the highest profanity rate, Connecticut and New Jersey, were also two of the three states with the highest integrity scores.

The **research paper**, which will be published in the **journal Social Psychological and Personality Science**, read: 'On the one hand, profane individuals are widely perceived as violating moral and social codes, and thus deemed untrustworthy and potentially antisocial and dishonest.

'On the other hand, profane language is considered as more authentic and unfiltered, thus making its users appear more honest and genuine.

'These opposing views on profanity raise the question of whether profane individuals tend to be more or less dishonest.'

The study was split into three separate studies, and the third one looked at how often people swear in each state.

It looked at whether state level rates of swearing predict state levels of integrity, based on already existing data from the State Integrity Investigation study in 2012.



The researchers analyzed the relationship between profanity and honesty in each state by looking at how often people swear in their Facebook statuses

Researchers analyzed the statuses of 73,789 Facebook users who use the English version on the website and looked at how often each person used swear words in their Facebook statuses.

To measure integrity, the researchers used data from The State Integrity Investigation in 2012, which ranked each state based on 14 integrity criteria, such as the presence of independent ethics commissions, legislative accountability and transparency.

It found that states with a higher profanity rate had a higher integrity score.

Two of the three states with the highest profanity rate, Connecticut and New Jersey, were also two of the three states with the highest integrity scores.

Some of the states with the lowest integrity scores and profanity rates were Georgia, Wyoming and South Dakota

The study found that higher rates of using profanities were associated with with greater honesty, however, it doesn't prove that being more honest necessarily causes people to swear more - but there is a link.

THE STATE INTEGRITY INVESTIGATION

- The State Integrity Investigation is a project that aims to assess the transparency, accountability and anti-corruption mechanisms in each state.
- Each state has a score and ranking, along with analytical pieces about every state.
- It measures the strength of laws and practices that encourage openness and deter corruption.
- Reporters in each state researched 330 "Corruption Risk Indicators" across 14 categories of government such as access to information, campaign finance, judicial accountability, budgeting, lobbying disclosure, pension fund management, ethics enforcement and insurance commission operations
